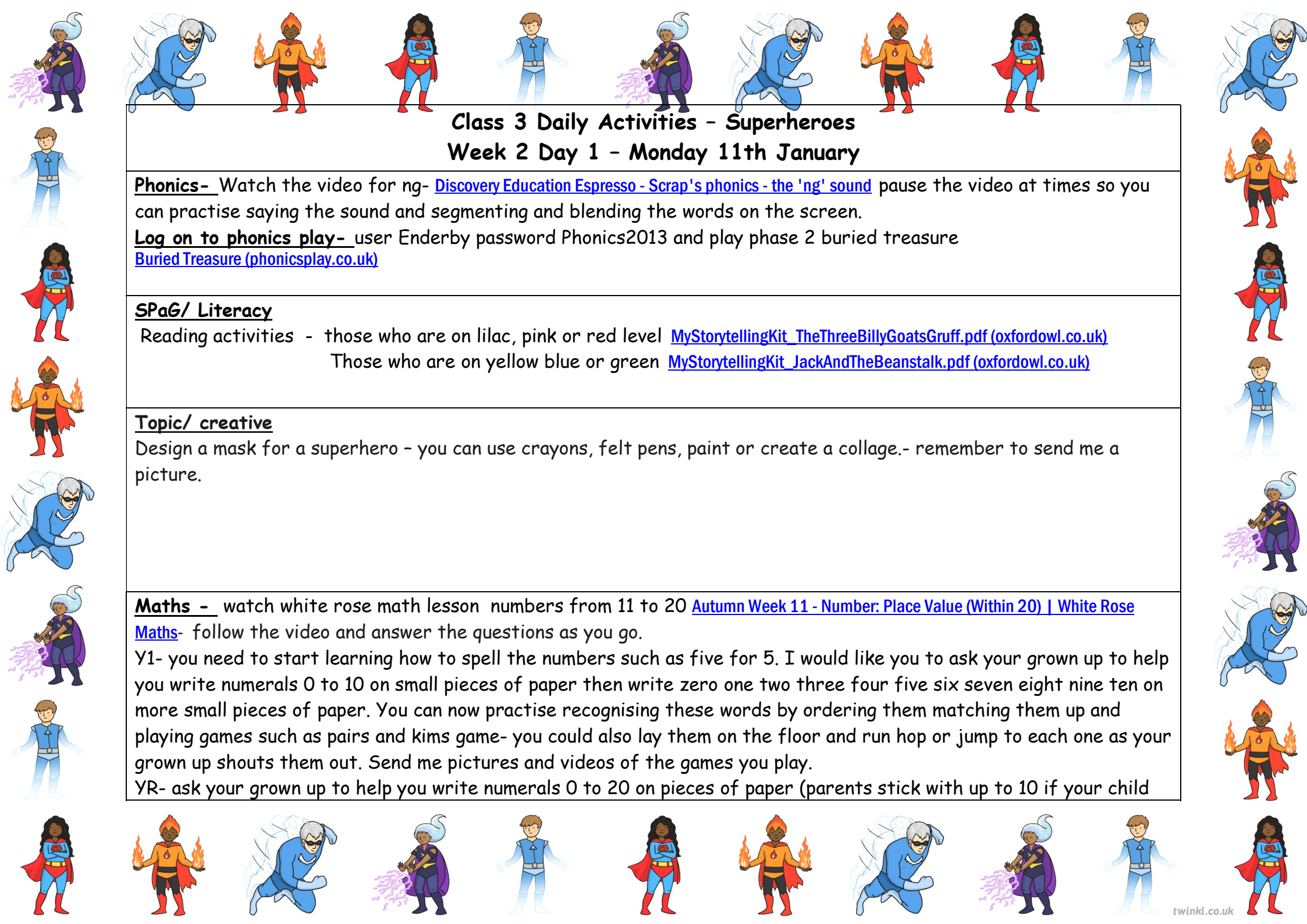

Topic/ creative

Design a mask for a superhero - you can use crayons, felt pens, paint or create a collage.- remember to send me a picture.

Maths - watch white rose math lesson numbers from 11 to 20 [Autumn Week 11 - Number: Place Value \(Within 20\) | White Rose Maths](#) follow the video and answer the questions as you go.

Y1- you need to start learning how to spell the numbers such as five for 5. I would like you to ask your grown up to help you write numerals 0 to 10 on small pieces of paper then write zero one two three four five six seven eight nine ten on more small pieces of paper. You can now practise recognising these words by ordering them matching them up and playing games such as pairs and kims game- you could also lay them on the floor and run hop or jump to each one as your grown up shouts them out. Send me pictures and videos of the games you play.

YR- ask your grown up to help you write numerals 0 to 20 on pieces of paper (parents stick with up to 10 if your child

isn't confident with these) now jumble them up and practise putting them in the correct order. Maybe you could time your self then challenge yourself to be quicker. When your numbers are in order close your eyes and ask your grown up to take a number away. Can you guess which is missing? If you are very good ask your grown up to take more than one away.
